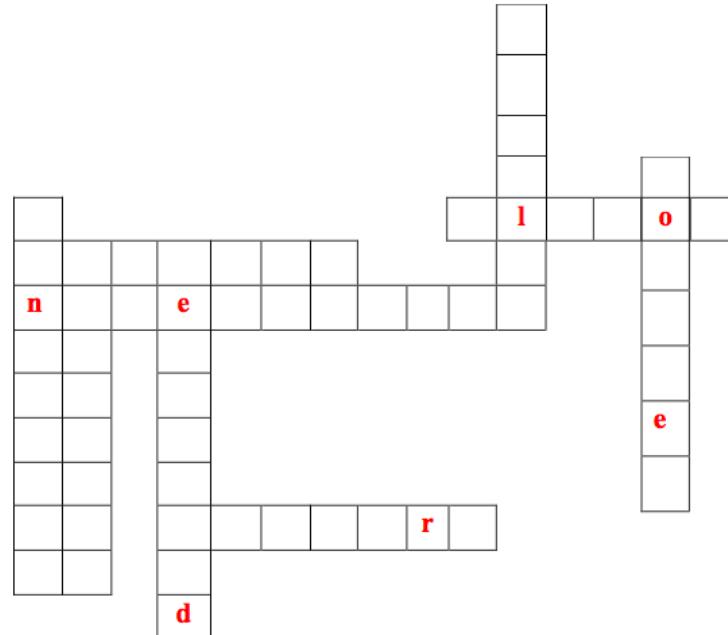

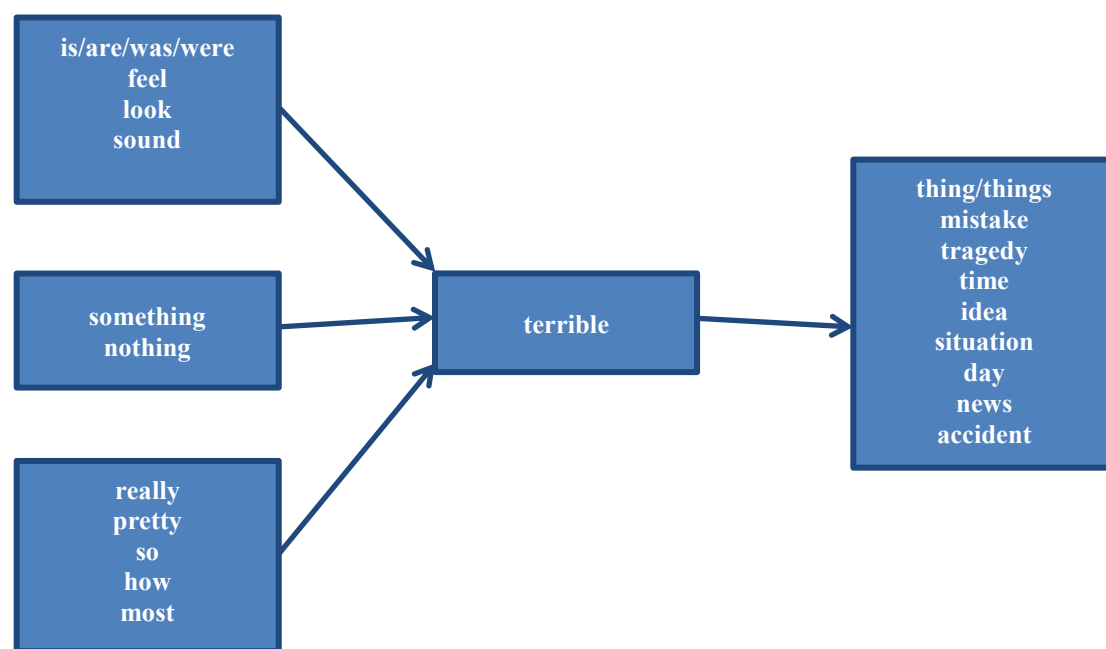

Word Awareness

The top left box shows the adverbs collocating with *terrible* modified by degree. The bottom left box shows the verbs that commonly collocate with *terrible*. The top right box shows the nouns always described by *terrible*. The bottom right box shows the English slangs where *terrible* is included.

‘I **feel terrible**!’ ‘What’s wrong, Sam?’

That **sounds terrible**. That’s not going to happen!

Something terrible happened in London, but I don’t know what it was.

Nothing terrible could happen in twenty minutes.

Words You Need to Know

attract (v.) cause to come to a place by offering something of interest. 吸引。Currywurst Museum attracts thousands of curry and sausage lovers every year.

bizarre (adj.) very strange or unusual, so as to cause interest. 奇特的。There are several bizarre museums around the world that you might not hear about.

display (v./n.) show something in a place where it can be easily seen. 展示，陈列。In Italy, you will find the Gelato Museum displaying all kinds of ice cream.

explore (v.) travel in or through another country or area to learn about it. 探索。We all love exploring foods when travelling, don't we?

fantastic (adj.) very good or attractive. 极好的。I've heard there is a fantastic Teddy Bear Museum.

flavor (n.) the taste of a food or drink. 味道。In Italy, you will find the Gelato Museum displaying ice cream with all kinds of flavors.

journey (n.) an act of traveling from one place to another. 旅程。Now why not join us for a special Museum Journey?

lecture/lecturer (n.) an educational talk; class/ a person who gives lectures, especially as a profession. 课/讲师。'Today's lecture was great, wasn't it?' 'Um... not too bad thanks, I like our lecturer's new shoes though.'

necessarily (adv.) of necessity, usually in negatives not necessarily to mean possibly but not surely. 必要地。Dessert is necessarily needed!

recommend (v.) suggest 推荐。Recommend me some bizarre museums, will you?

terrible (adj.) very bad or serious. 糟糕的。It displays plenty of terrible paintings.

theme (n./v.) The subject of a talk, a piece of writing, or other things; a topic. 主题。Europe actually has some food-themed museums.

unfortunately (adv.) unluckily. 不幸地。Unfortunately, if you are a vegetarian, you probably have to give up trying this one.

vegetarian (n.) a person who does not eat meat, and sometimes other animal products. 素食主义者。Unfortunately, if you are a vegetarian, you probably have to give up trying this one.

worldwide (adv./adj.) throughout the world. 全世界地。It displays plenty of terrible paintings, which were collected worldwide.

apart from except for, besides, other than 除了。Apart from your main dish, dessert is not necessarily needed.

figure out (informal) solve or find the cause of a problem. 想出，解决。Ah, I'm still figuring it out...

give up stop making an effort. 放弃。If you are a vegetarian, you probably have to give up trying this one.

plenty of a large amount; more than enough. 许多。It displays plenty of terrible paintings.

related to connected with. 有联系的。I believe most of them are related to arts, history, or fashion.

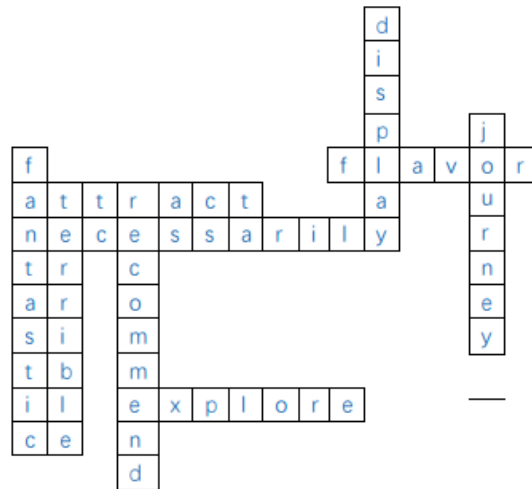
